

Presbytery Mission Planning Update

The Moray part of the Presbytery Mission Plan for the Presbytery of the North East and the Northern Isles has been approved by Presbytery and by the appropriate national bodies. Presbytery recorded that agreement at its meeting on 7 November 2023. The plan for the Lossiemouth Area is still as agreed by Moray Presbytery in September 2022:

- the eventual union of Duffus, Spynie and Hopeman congregation with the two Lossiemouth congregations, forming one new inclusive congregation with one set of office-bearers and finances
- an eventual team ministry of 1 full-time Minister, one half-time pastoral assistant, one part-time Ordained Local Minister, and trained local leadership
- the potential for Local Mission Churches in the Hopeman and Duffus areas, where local leadership can get on with worship, service and outreach with less administration
- the retention of Duffus Kirk building and Lossiemouth St. James' Church and hall
- the disposal (probably sale or transfer) of Hopeman Kirk, Spynie Kirk and Lossiemouth St. Gerardine's High buildings by August 2027
- worship, service and outreach in all parts of the parish will continue, at times and in places that are available, accessible and make sense in each community
- October Session meeting

On 12 October a letter came to the Kirk Session from the Hopeman "Kirk Action Group" asking the Session to revisit the decision the Board and Session made in June 2022 – which was to recommend to Presbytery the retention of Duffus Kirk and the disposal of Hopeman Kirk (alongside the proposed disposal of Spynie Kirk). This was discussed at the Session meeting of 30 October, which was attended by members of the Congregational Board and 16 members of the wider congregation and community.

Given the lengthy and detailed processes already gone through by Presbytery, Board and Session, including excellent presentations of all positions in June 2022 and further discussion by the Board in November 2022, it was not competent to revisit the decision as requested. However, in the interests of fairness and transparency the meeting did allow lengthy consideration of whether there were any grounds for the Kirk Session to request a review of the Presbytery Mission Plan, which would have been possible in November.

There was extensive discussion, involving members of Session and observers at the meeting. Some parties argued that there were grounds for review because Presbytery had not been presented with some material facts about the Hopeman Church building. It was noted that those material facts had been presented to the Board and Session on 6 June (when the recategorisation of Hopeman and Duffus church building was proposed) and were included in the appendix to the briefing paper distributed to Moray Presbytery ahead of its meeting of 6 September 2022. Eventually the Session voted not to revisit the matter of building categorisations. There was therefore no review requested of our part of the Presbytery Mission Plan.

Way forward?

The next meeting of the Kirk Session, on 22 January 2024, will explore the way forward with the adjustments and buildings that the Presbytery Mission Plan requires. While there are formal processes to be worked through (over time), and legal matters to be explored, most important will be engagement in the congregation and our communities. We all need opportunities to mourn losses, share stories and envisage our future mission. If you require any further information about these meetings and discussions – or if you have any ideas about the best ways forward in 2024 – please get in touch for a chat.

You are invited to communion

We are all invited to gather for communion - the family meal of the church. In communion we are fed and nourished by Jesus for the journey ahead. A sacrament is a wonderful mystery that engages our bodies and spirits as well as our minds. Communion is a visible, edible, tastable and touchable sign that God loves us first and always. Jesus invites us to come, take, eat – we are all invited. You are invited. The Kirk Session has decided that for 2024 we will celebrate communion every eight weeks. Whenever we share communion, we do what we can to make it safe, inclusive and welcoming for everyone. To include everybody, we use non-alcoholic grape juice and bread that is free from gluten, wheat and milk.

Please join us if you can. And if you are unable to join us, please speak to your elder or contact me about home communion. Rev Jenny

Zoom Fellowship Meetings

Children & Young People

Members of the Kirk Sessions and Congregational Boards of the Lossiemouth area congregations – that's ourselves, Lossie St. Gerardine's High and Lossie St. James' – have been meeting to get to know each other and to begin to work together towards our eventual union.

On 14th October we gathered to chat about working with children and young people, identified by us all as really important. We recognised how much we are already doing to reach out to children, young people and their families. I joined the Lossie summer holiday club this year, our Forest Church engages some families regularly, and we all try to offer something for all ages in Sunday worship.

However, we also recognised that it isn't easy for younger folk to be the only one in their age range in church. This led to chat about the importance of the welcome of the entire church family to people of any age — a question for all of us. Do you offer a welcoming smile and word to people you don't know, whatever age? Are we serious about being an intergenerational body?

One significant contact we have with young people is through schools chaplaincy. All our ministry team are involved in Hopeman Primary and Lossie High School, regularly engaging with young people. (Our parish also includes parts of Elgin school catchments - chaplaincy there is led by the Elgin Area churches.)

However, school chaplaincy and support is not just for ministers to do. Our local schools are always looking for community support – to attend events, to share skills, to support pupils with reading, and to get involved in projects/committees.

Is that something you can get involved in? Why not contact our local schools if you have time to give?

Anne-Marie has offered to convene a wee team to explore our support of children and young people. So far it has one volunteer!



Blue Christmas

As we celebrate Christmas – the promise of God with us – we also know that it can be a very difficult season for many of us for many reasons. The pressures on finances and families, the awareness of losses, the long dark nights, global crises, ill health in body and mind, uncertainty about the future – all of these can make it hard to find the Christmas cheer that society seems to expect of us all. We make space for the complexities of these feelings in our Blue Christmas service. This will take place on Friday 22nd December at 7.30pm in Hopeman Kirk – just past the longest night. This is open to anyone who wants to attend and is a quiet reflective service. It includes the opportunity for everyone to light candles for any people or situations we want to remember.

God is with us, always – including in the valley of the shadow of death – and the birth of Jesus shows us God coming into all the complexities of life. May that give us all hope.

Moray Food Plus

As part of our harvest thanksgiving this year we collected £265 for Moray Food Plus, from offerings and a fabulous soup lunch after worship in Spynie Kirk. This is in addition to our regular gathering of food and toiletries on the first Sunday of every month. Thank you to everyone who supports this work, which is unfortunately so essential for people just now.

Moray Food Plus provides a variety of services to those either experiencing or at risk of food insecurity. They also work with partners to reduce the amount of local food waste taking surplus food and redistributing it amongst the community.

Food poverty is on the increase in Moray. Moray Food Plus is working hard to support people who through no fault of their own find themselves in crisis. Reasons for this are varied but include changes in personal circumstances, illness, welfare reform, low income, and unexpected bills.

The crisis service works on a referral basis from agencies such as social work, housing and health. They also accept self-referrals. Once a referral is received a team of volunteers make up a food parcel containing three days' worth of food (including pet and baby food on request).

As part of our Eco Congregation work, Anne-Marie has helped the toddler group at Spynie to plant bulbs – something we can all enjoy in the spring, and an early treat for insects. We are also hoping to extend bird feeding – if anyone has spare bird feeders that could be hung in our church gardens, please let me know. As we approach Christmas, we are very aware of the pressure to consume more. While that often comes in the form of giving and sharing, it can have significant impact on the wider web of life we are part of. So we offer a few questions – which I know will seem obvious to many of you, but may be helpful prompts to the rest of us…

- Refuse Do you really need to buy it? And do you really need another bag or lots of packaging?
- Reduce Can we buy or use less? Small is beautiful.
- Reuse Call it vintage, pre-loved, secondhand, charity shops, refurbished, leftovers how can you give new life or find new homes for things?
- Repurpose Can leftovers be transformed into something different? Is transformation possible for something tired or broken? Do you know someone with skills to help?
- Recycle If something is really finished its useful life, can we access all the local recycling facilities? Remember there are boxes in each church building collecting batteries, light bulbs, spectacles and printer ink cartridges.
- Is it local? We have amazing food and drink locally, thanks to very hardworking farmers, growers, fishermen, producers, processors and more. We can support them, minimise food miles and enjoy the cycle of seasons.


Is it fairtrade? Where things have to come from further afield, like our tea, coffee, chocolate, sugar and bananas, are the people producing them being fairly paid so that they can flourish?

Forest Church

Forest Church gathers every month, alternating between Hopeman East Beach and the woods around Duffus House. Our ages currently range from 2-92 and we gather looking to encounter God in the big book of creation.

Christmas Offerings Charities

The Kirk Session has agreed that the offerings at the special Christmas services will be shared between two charities this year: Barnabas Aid and Elgin Street Pastors. There will also be a festive buffet lunch after worship on Sunday 17th December in aid of them.

Barnabas Aid works to provide hope and aid for suffering Christians. Barnabas Aid is an international aid agency that aims to support Christian communities, churches and individuals around the world who face persecution and discrimination because of their faith.

The main ministry of Barnabas Aid is to send financial support to projects which help Christians where they suffer discrimination, oppression and persecution as a consequence of their faith. The projects aim to strengthen Christian individuals, churches and their communities by providing material support (such as food and medical supplies) and spiritual support in response to needs identified by local Christian leaders.

They seek to encourage and facilitate prayer by providing prayer information, prayer requests and resources in many different forms and formats – see www.barnabasaid.org/gb/pray

They also raise awareness of the plight of the persecuted Church by a wide variety of means, in order to educate Christians and others about the current situation and needs as well as the background and causal factors.

Elgin Street Pastors – Caring, Listening, Helping

Street pastors are trained volunteers from local churches who care about their community. They patrol in teams, usually from 10 p.m. to 4 a.m. on a Saturday night in Elgin town centre, to care for, listen to and help people who are out on the streets.

Street pastors are an approachable and non-judgemental presence engaging with everyone out in the town. They offer a chat and practical support for anyone who wants it — they are well known for sharing water, lollipops and flip-flops. They provide safety for folk who are vulnerable in any way and work alongside business staff, the police and other services.

Elgin Street Pastors also have teams of School Pastors in Elgin High School and Forres Academy. In those contexts they care for and support the school communities. They promote safety and aim to reduce anti-social behaviour through listening, caring and helping young people to become good citizens. Rev Jenny
